

Pegasus House Palliative Care Program strives to bring comfort and care to patients facing challenging health issues. It seeks to ease pain and suffering while providing the best possible quality of life for patients afflicted with chronic or life-limiting illnesses. And it embraces the patient's family, because not only are family members key to providing care and comfort to the patient, but also they are in need of care and comfort themselves.

The program was initiated with a generous grant from Emilie and Michael Corey in 2008. They perceived that healing and curing are plural objectives of healthcare while recognizing that they are not always the same.

Healing is spiritual, universal, timeless, rooted in the Grecian Hippocratic Oath and oriented on the patient's well being. Curing is driven by ever-evolving science and technology, focusing on the patient's body.

Funding from the Corey grant enabled Peconic Bay Medical Center to hire, train and integrate professional staff to deliver the compassionate healing services of palliative care. Those involved include:

Staff from departments such as food service, transportation and housekeeping are also trained to recognize the need for sensitivity when caring for palliative care patients and their families.

Pegasus House had its first patient-family referral in March 2009. Since then, there's been a dramatic growth in the number Of referrals. Initially, bedside care for referred patients was provided in nursing units throughout the hospital or in a patient's home. Assembling family members and support personnel in a quiet private space became increasingly challenging as the program grew.


In order to accommodate this growing program, the Medical Center is creating a four-bed private unit attached to its Skilled Nursing Facility.

The patient rooms are modeled to create a home-like ambiance within an area that permits overnight stays as needed for family members, and a kitchen and dinning area will be available to family members for meal prepa-ration. A glassenclosed day room will look out upon a therapeutic garden adorned with perennial and annual plantings graced with sculpture. Corridors will provide access to the garden for patients and their families, offering an environment for quiet reflection.
